

Convenient and Sacrosanct Sink for Dumping Excessive T&D Losses




Three Crucial Evidences

- MSEB's Feeder Monitoring Data (for 27 feeders) \Rightarrow 1,020 Hr. / year

Three Critical Factors Determining the Conclusion

⇒ Lack of Internally Consistent Data and Information and Lack of Reliable Evidence Supporting the Data

 \Rightarrow Financial Situation of MSEB and Timing of The Proposal

 \Rightarrow Sanctity of Process and Going Back to People

- Blow to Sanctity in the Past Led to the Grotesque Inefficiencies and Loss of Public Faith
- Resolving the Conflict between the 'Imperative of Process Sanctity' and 'Situational or Substantive Compulsions'
- Altering the Frame of Reference Posing Serious Threat to Process Sanctity

Plea:

⇒ The Commission, through Interim Order, Directs MSEB to Come Back with Revised Proposal for the FY 2000-2001
